

Pastor's Corner

[Jesus said] I was hungry and you gave me food to eat. I was thirsty and you gave me a drink. I was a stranger and you welcomed me. --Matthew 25:35

Dear friends in Christ,

We are now deep in the church season of Lent, and looking forward to Holy Week and Easter at the end of March. Lent being a season of turning to God and renewing our faith, I give thanks that it has also been the season of caring for one another and our neighbors near and far here at St. Paul's. In addition to the many regular ways our community cares for one another, during Lent we are having a food drive and also a special event to celebrate the work of the Winona Immigration Network and hear directly from recent immigrants (Wednesday March 20th, see more elsewhere in this March Newsletter).

When I first hear the story of St. Paul's back altar table having the history of being from a local grocery store, and used as a counter there, I immediately had what I simply call a "God moment." Then when I heard about your recent food drive outreach where you used the theme "Bury the Altar" the God moment returned with an extra dose of confirmation that the Holy Spirit is at work here and now!

There is such a rich history and Christian tradition connecting Holy Communion with feeding those who come to the table. When Jesus first ordained what we now call Holy Communion along with his "new law" to love one another (John 13:34; traditional gospel text for Maundy Thursday worship), he did so as he sat at a meal with his closest disciples. We do not know exactly who was there (likely many more than his closest 12 disciples), yet we do know that they were gathered around a meal!

Because we know that Holy Communion began as a meal, I generally refer to the furniture we use as "the table" or the "communion table" rather than "the altar." Here at St. Paul's we have the beautiful back altar as well as the moveable table that we use to set up communion each time we celebrate. The ancient Greek words used by early Christians reflected both the reality of a table and a sacrificial altar. The connection to a sacrificial altar are two-fold as Christianity emerged from Jewish traditions that did at that time include temple sacrifice, and this is also why most churches have their altars or tables set aside in a special place in their sanctuaries. As the theology around Holy Communion evolved, some traditions also focused on Jesus' sacrifice (death on the cross) as connected to Christ's body and blood at communion.

In general, the Catholic and Orthodox Christian traditions continue to focus on the sacrificial nature of Holy Communion, while protestant traditions generally focus on the "communing" with God, how God feeds us at the table, and the connection to Jesus' commandment to love one another. Protestants also have a long tradition of striving to center their worship on Jesus, rather than the many things that point to Jesus, including the furniture in our churches. Ultimately our church altars or communion tables are furniture, and not to be worshiped in and of themselves.

We, as disciples of Christ, give the things that surround us meaning with how we use them and talk about them. Using our altar and/or communion table to gather the food we are sending out to feed the hungry, is living out Jesus' command to love one another AND reflects our striving to live out Matthew 25:34 (above) as well. Such use also makes this connection in ways that our children and visitors can witness and learn our Christ-centered values. It allows for more God moments.

I am thankful to serve in a community that lives out the words Jesus proclaims!

<u>Property Management:</u> The painting and repairs have been made in the back entryway, hall ways, offices, and sanctuary. The ramp in front of church will be raised and new

railings installed when it warms up. The drain in the kitchen has been a problem and was taken care of. The gas oven burners have been having trouble. We learned that there are batteries for the spark to ignite the burners. Rich Tucker plans to see that our fire extinguishers are checked.

Stewardship Committee: No report at this time.

<u>Parish Education:</u> Everything is running smoothly in Sunday school. Pastor Tami is in charge of the confirmation class and they continue to meet most Wednesdays.

<u>Outreach and Evangelism:</u> The group continues to help where needed. The Souper Bowl Sunday Fundraiser for April and Andrew Hovelson was a huge success.

<u>Congregational Life:</u> They continue to provide a coffee fellowship once a month and also helped with the Hovelson Fundraiser.

<u>St. Paul's Youth:</u> Our teens had a fellowship event where they went out for pizza and bowling in Rushford. We made another YouthWorks payment toward our St. Louis Mission Trip. We plan to serve Palm Sunday Sundaes on Palm Sunday, and host the Easter Breakfast. S.P.Y. will be selling spring flowers to decorate our church for Easter. New software - We may be looking at some new software, which was tabled until the next meeting.

<u>MinnWest Bank online banking system has changed</u> - Linda was having problems getting into the system. A motion was made by Ann Lubinski and seconded by Leann Jacobson to try the token device through MinnWest that was recommended.

<u>Crossings Farmers Market</u> – We are thinking about sponsoring a day during the summer.

<u>Brainstorming</u> - Council members were encouraged to think about ideas of what we want to do as a church to help the community by our March meeting.

Pastor closed the meeting in prayer. A motion was passed to adjourn the meeting at 9:15pm.




Is there a quilter among you at St. Paul's?

BURY THE ALTAR March 3-24

Rushford Food Shelf Presentation

Many of the people we serve are limited in their ability to work and earn money. They may be seniors, disabled, a family with young children, or someone with an injury or health issue that limits their ability to work or pay for child care. We also help people who are unemployed or underemployed while they look for a new job. People can qualify by current income being at or below 300% of the poverty level, or by participating in programs like SNAP, WIC, free/reduced lunch, and Energy Assistance.

When most people think about hunger, they think of people going without food or having less food than they should. Food insecurity encompasses so much more than that. Being food secure is having enough food at all times for everyone in the household to have a healthy, active life. When that isn't the case, people eat smaller or less healthy meals. Maybe they eat only once or twice in a day or eat cheaper foods with empty calories. This will affect a person's health and their performance at work or school, especially children. Not only are people not getting proper nutrition, but the stress of knowing there isn't enough money and food for today or tomorrow, or maybe to last through the weekend, adds to the problems that food insecurity causes.

I began managing the Rushford Food Shelf in June of 2007, and in that time, our community has experienced flooding, recessions, high gas prices, Covid, and inflation. Any one of these things can lead to someone becoming food insecure. In rural areas like ours, many job openings are part-time, lower paying, and may not have benefits. Even one missed sick day without pay can have a huge impact on a household's budget. If a few days are missed, the impact is even greater. 40% of households can't cover an unexpected \$400 expense, be it a car repair or medical expenses. People may have additional gas expenses if they have to drive a distance to get to work, so they are sensitive to the price of gas. Lost income or extra expenses can really impact a person's ability to put food on the table. We help fill the gap in people's budgets.

We currently average between 20 to 25 pounds of food and household items per person, so we distribute around 3,500 pounds every month. In 2022, we served 129 households, with 352 people, and distributed 50,048 pounds.

We get the majority of our food from the Channel One Food Bank, but we also get regular donations from Rushford Foods and Kwik Trip. This allows us to carry a good variety of items: fresh, canned, boxed, refrigerated, and frozen. We aren't able to carry everything all the time, but we make an effort to have healthy options available and everything to make a complete and easy meal. Clients are allowed to select their items within guidelines, so no one has to take any food they don't want, but also so that they get enough food for their family size. We also offer personal, baby, and household items.

Many people are ashamed or embarrassed that they need help. It is important to us that the Rushford Food Shelf is a friendly and welcoming place. We have people who can't look us in the eye when they first come in, but we have them laughing before they leave.

I was very touched by two women in particular. One of them opened the fridge door and started to cry a little. I asked her if she was ok, and she said "Today is my birthday. I didn't think I was going to have a cake." We happened to have some decorated cakes that had been donated. The other woman was going through a very difficult time and cried in relief because the intake was so easy and she was going to be able to walk out that day with enough food to get by. That is the part of food insecurity that most people don't think about. That's also what makes our work so rewarding. What we do really makes a positive difference in their lives. We have had many new clients bring in a friend or family member that needs help too. We know we have served them well if they bring in others.

We took a typical selection of food for one person weighing 25.3#. It was a mix of donated and purchased items. To buy all of it in the store would have cost \$68.40. The cost to us was \$6.00. This is why we are able to make such an impact for the people we serve.

There are so many reasons why someone may be food insecure, and these may be short term or long term problems. But either way, we can be a helping hand when needed. It makes a difference for their health and well-being, and in their life, knowing they have a safe and welcoming place to go when they need food.

The majority of funding to support the food shelf is through donations. Our food costs per person used to be closer to \$2.50, so we have been impacted by the limited availability of donated food and rising food costs. We can't make a difference in our community without the donations and financial support of people, businesses, community groups, and religious organizations in our area. Thank you for supporting us and those in need.

Our Lent focus this year is on seeing Jesus and we are working with WIN, Winona Immigrant Network, to create a special event night here at St. Paul's. We have the chance to see and experience the love of Jesus in both the work of welcoming our newest immigrant neighbors and in witnessing their stories.

St. Paul's is sponsoring a free-will chili supper on Wednesday, March 20 from 5:30-6:30 PM to support WIN. Central Lutheran Church in Winona, St. Paul's, and several other area churches comprise the membership of WIN. WIN's mission is to "accompany" immigrants on their flight from danger in their country, and to help them integrate into US life to become happy, productive citizens. These are all wonderful people who will only make our communities more rich and interesting. They will also share their hard work, and skills to make their community better.



Following the dinner, at 6:30, some of our new area residents "accompanied" by the WIN network, will share a little about why they had to leave their country, how they got here, what their life has been like since they came to the Winona area, and what their dreams are for the future.



Hussain Ali Froogh came to Winona in February 2022 after spending 6 months at Fort McCoy. He left Afghanistan in the US evacuation in August of 2022. Hussain is a mathematics teacher. He and his brother taught young women and men at the school that he and his brother owned in Kabul, Afghanistan. The school was a prep school for the equivalent of the ACT and SAT college entrance tests in the US.

Hussain lives in Winona, and is spon-

sored by a "sister" refugee group, Winona Afghan Support Network, (WASN). Hussain worked at Behrens Manufacturing for the first year he was here, and has done mathematics tutoring in an area school and Door Dash driving. He is awaiting the arrival of his two small children, and his wife who could not get out in the evacuation of Afghanistan. They have not been together for more than two years.

Edelber Jimena-Moriones came in December of 2021 from Colombia and is sponsored by WIN, He will not be able to join us as he works an 11 PM-7AM shift at Behrens Manufacturing in Winona, running robotic machines in the manufacturing process. Edelber is currently attending Minnesota State College SE in a daytime class regarding Robotics. Edelber has a wife and two young sons who will join him in the future.

Alex and Veronica, and son Jeronimo Saenz came in late October of 2023. Veronica, a nurse specializing in phlebotomy, is Edelber's sister-in law. Their 11-year-old son, Jeronimo attends the Winona Middle School. Her husband Alex, owned a cellphone accessory store/business in Bogata, Colombia and also has worked in graphic art. The family lives in Winona, and is awaiting the arrival of their work permits which should arrive in early to mid-summer. During this waiting time they are studying English diligently, and doing some volunteer work in the Winona community.

Masouma Mohammadi left Afghanistan in August of 2021 alone. Her husband was assassinated by the Taliban. As Masouma brought her boys to the airport to be evacuated, her two boys were left outside the airport compound gate that was quickly shut between her and her children, to avoid a crowd surge. She was told that her boys would be put on the next plane leaving...they were not. Her mother was able to retrieve the boys and has cared for them in Afghanistan for the last two years. Masouma is awaiting the arrival of the boys. She worked for a brief time at Watkins in Winona, and then got a job as a dorm "mother" in the Cotter High School international dormitory where she has lived. During the daytime, she works as an assistant at Bluffview Montessori School early child-



hood program and after school care.

Julio and Jazmina

Julio Enrique Miranda and his wife Jazmina Yamileth Penado arrived from Manaqua, Nicaragua on February 22, 2024 and are sponsored by WIN. Both Julio and Jazmina were former exchange students in the US in the 80s, and in fact, that is how they met! They are both high school teachers. Julio taught computer science, and does computer repair. Jazmina taught English and has some training in computer repair also. They are hoping to continue their teaching profession in the United States.
