Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice!


And may the peace of God, which passes all understanding, keep your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus. --Philippians 4:4, 7

October Minutes of the St. Paul's Church Council Meeting - Oct. 12th, 2023

6:30pm - Opened with a prayer given by Pastor Tami.

Those present at the meeting were: Pastor Tami, John Botten, Leann Jacobson, Jim Olson, Jeff Nelson, and Diane Rislow.

The secretary's report was approved, motioned and seconded by Leann and Jim.

The treasurer's report was approved, motion and seconded by Jim and Leann.

- *The bill for the back entry flooring and covering the steps will be paid for \$5,350. We were very pleased with the results.
- *We received and really appreciate the donation made in memory of Dona Ferguson.
- *We were short of our budget needs in September by \$2,500. However, there was one week of offerings that was not included in this amount.

Worship Committee Report – Jeff

- *The committee was able to meet with Pastor Tami.
- *Holy Commotion will be singing again in November.
- *Preparing for upcoming services such as Reformation Sunday. All Saints Day, and Advent. Advent will start one week earlier so we can have the traditional four Sundays of Advent.
- *Our Christmas Eve Service will be held at 4pm on Sunday, Dec. 24th. There will not be a service on Christmas Day.
- *Bibles are going to be given to youth that have not received one yet. Traditionally Bibles are given when our youth are in 3rd grade.
- *Congregation members have submitted their favorite hymns, and we will continue using them again in worship.

Stewardship Committee Report – Jeff – no report

Property Management Report – LeAnn

*We are having troubles with the three sink drains in the kitchen. Leann will try to take care of this and if needed, will call H & M Plumbing and Heating.

Parish Ed. Report – Diane

<u>Sunday school</u> – We have enough teachers now with the addition of Dawn Mueller, who is willing to be a substitute. Bonnie Brand is looking into another No Rehearsal Christmas Play. This would take place during a Dec. service.

<u>Confirmation</u> – Pastor Tami had a special informational meeting on Oct. 11th with 7th & 8th graders and their parents. The first confirmation class will be Wednesday, Oct. 25th. There are two - 8th graders and five - 7th graders this year. Ann Ziesel has volunteered to be a parent volunteer during class.

<u>S.P.Y.</u> - Our youth and parents were able to help Pastor David and family load up their truck for moving. We received a more than generous donation for our help. Our youth and parents were back at it again to help with a farewell pancake brunch for pastor's last day. Holy Commotion sang for this service. We also prepared a "roast" for pastor. **S.P.Y. Continued:** Our group attended the Fields of Faith Event which is student-led by the Fellowship of Christian Athletes at LAHS. Out of nine leaders there were four youth from our church that are leaders and shared their testimonies of faith. It was approved that Linda Ballard and Diane can go to the Communicator's Workshop in Rochester on Tuesday, Oct. 24th. This event is put on the ELCA SE MN Synod and there is no charge.

Old Business

*A motion was made and seconded by Leann and Jim to approve hiring Priority Construction for roof repairs. A down payment of \$1,072.00 will be made so that we can begin this fall. We were unable to secure a bid from local construction workers. The water leaks from the roof have done damage to sheet rock in several areas in the church. Before we repair that damage, the roof needs to be repaired.

*We need to form a call committee even if we want to pursue Pastor Tami as our permanent pastor and she agrees that we are a good fit. We need to figure out where we are headed as a church. So far Melissa Nelson and Cole Kreidermacher have volunteered to be on the committee, but we are looking for four more people to serve.

*We have applied to the Fischer Foundation for a grant to help us with repairs to our infrastructure. We are hoping the grant will cover several projects.

New Business

*Leann and Diane will contact local electricians to see if we can get heat cables or pads installed to eliminate ice dams on our roof. We would like this project taken care of before snow starts. *We would like to get a bid on fixing/painting the water damaged sheetrock in the sanctuary. We will invite Ryann Kronebusch and Chris Heim to our next council meeting to discuss what we need one.

*It was approved to use direct deposit for payment to Pastor Tami. She will also be receiving a credit card to help her make purchases like Pastor David used.

*Pastor Tami will be part of Continuous Growth Pathways. This program is for deacons and pastors in the SE and SW ELCA Synods. She will have learning opportunities, retreats and workshops.

The next council meeting will be held Thursday, Nov. 9th.

8pm - A motion to adjourn the meeting was made and seconded by Jim and Leann.

We ended in a prayer given by Pastor Tami.

Greeting visitors is an important part when strangers come to church or people looking for a church home. Another important part is how the church looks. By that we mean paraments and banners and flowers.



What Is Advent?

Advent means "arrival" and signifies the start of an event or the arrival of a person. Advent is a season in the Church calendar dedicated to the hopeful anticipation for the arrival or "advent" of Jesus of Nazareth. During the four-week period leading up to Christmas, many Advent observers

engage in prayer, meditation, and Scripture study that emphasizes hope, peace, love, and joy. Christians from many backgrounds celebrate this time, and while their practices may look different, all focus on the hope-filled arrival of Jesus, the long-awaited Messiah and King.

Dear Mr. Botten and MS Hovelson:

It is my pleasure to inform you that the Webster and Marcella Fischer Family Foundation has approved a grant to St. Paul's Evangelical Church in the amount of \$50,000.00 to assist with the renovation to the physical church building and surrounding property. This grant must be used exclusively for the project as described in your letter dated September 30, 2023, and your grant application request dated September 20,2023 and cannot be used for any other project or purpose. U. S. Charitable Grant Trust, the organization providing administrative services to our Foundation, will be issuing a check to you in a few days.

Normally our Foundation does not fund the entire amount of a grant request and has never funded an amount in excess of the requested amount. Also, we generally do not fund the entire cost of the requested project believing that the organization itself needs to have "skin in the game" through either their own funds, funding from other outside sources or volunteer work. We note that your project plans on meeting two of these conditions through the use of your insurance proceeds and the contribution from the Cemetery Committee and in-kind work by church members.

Your proposed project is multifaceted, and we expect that there will be some unexpected costs as the project moves forward. Accordingly, the amount to be funded by our Foundation is slightly in excess of the grant that you requested in order to help absorb such cost overruns.

Our family is extremely fortunate to be able to continue its involvement with non-profit organizations to attempt to improve the quality of life within the Lewiston community. We are pleased that the memory of our parents, Webster and Marcella Fischer, will in some way be associated with this project.

You do not need to send our Foundation a tax receipt for this grant. Endorsement of the check that you will receive with respect to this grant will represent proof of a charitable contribution and that the funds do not represent a payment for goods, services or other value provided to any person or organization. If you are unable to fulfill the purpose of this grant, please contact me immediately.

Enclosed is a press release that you might consider providing to local newspapers to announce receipt of the grant.

SEMN Synod Call Process Overview for Congregations and Councils

Once the council and the Assistant to the Bishop discern the best Model(s) moving forward and they have discerned the transition-time pastor, the pastor arrives, is welcomed, oriented, and begins service to the congregation.

After the transition-time pastor has begun their service, a meeting of the transition-time pastor, the congregational council, and the assistant to the bishop will be held. This group will determine the needs and possible concerns to be addressed during the transition time. Goals for the transition-time are set and a tentative schedule for moving forward will be set.

Congregational Council Support during the Transition-time

A congregation's council provides important leadership, a calming presence, and reassurance during a time of transition. The following are ways the congregation's council can provide support during this time:

Oversee and guide the ministry of the congregation during the time between pastoral leadership.

Reassure members that pastoral ministry tasks will be fulfilled;

Provide leaders to assure continuation of worship services and assist worship leaders

Give support and guidance to staff persons who normally function under pastoral supervision (continuation of staff meetings to help clarify needs, directions, expectations);

Assure continuation of pastoral ministries (hospital and other visits, emergency pastoral response, funerals, weddings, confirmation, baptisms);

Support congregational leaders in the service of their various responsibilities;

Assure confidentiality in regard to sensitive issues which arise during the transition;

Be a resource to the next called pastor and assist her/him in the continuation of immediate and special pastoral ministry needs.

Phase One: Formation of the Call Committee

When the congregational council, transition-time pastor, and Assistant to the Bishop determine it is time, the call committee is formed as per congregation's constitution and is installed at worship. Some congregations choose to utilize a 'self-study team' to do the work of the self-study phase two and a call committee to do the work of the interviewing/discerning the candidate of choice phase three. If this is the case for your congregation, the call committee need not be formed until this phase is completed.

The first step in this work is to discern whom God is calling to the work of the call committee. Serving on a call committee is an opportunity to experience how the local congregation works in partnership with the greater church and to participate in opening a new chapter in the life and ministry of the local congregation. The call committee oversees the self-study process and completing the Ministry Site Profile before participating in candidate interviews.

Check your congregation's constitution. The constitution governing your congregation will prescribe whether the call committee is to be appointed by the congregation council or elected by the membership. It also will prescribe the number of persons who are to serve on the call committee.

Council Representative. Often one congregation council member sits on the call committee as a liaison. The council representative usually does not have a vote on the committee, unless the congregational constitution states otherwise. The representative reports to the congregation council the progress of the call committee, but he/she may not violate the confidentiality of the call committee.

Size of committee. The model constitution for congregations recommends that six (6) members compose the call committee. It is helpful to have one or two alternates who also meet with the call committee and who can be called to become a voting member of the committee if one of the members becomes unable to fulfill his/her term. Because of the need for the call committee to work efficiently and to have as many members as possible at all of its meetings, call committees larger than nine (9) people are not recommended.

SEMN Synod Call Process cont.

Qualities of members. When identifying candidates for the call committee, it is important to seek persons who:

regularly attend worship and participate in the life of the congregation through stewardship of their time and treasure

will make this work a top priority

can maintain confidentiality

can both listen deeply and also share their impressions

enjoy the trust and respect of the whole membership of the congregation

can think and decide for the good of the entire congregation rather than their own personal desires or that of any small group

do NOT have any personal agendas, grievances or power issues within the congregation

are not employed by the congregation or past pastors (or their spouses) of the congregation

are not from the same family (i.e., spouses or parent/child) as others on the call committee.

Composition of the Call Committee. The call committee as a whole should be as diverse in age, gender, ethnicity and interests as the congregation is. It is helpful to have people who have been members of the congregation for different lengths of time.

Commissioning/Blessing of the Call Committee. It is important to recognize the ministry of those who have been elected to serve on the call committee. The congregation may use the "Commissioning of the Call Committee" (found in the resources at the back of this packet) as a way of blessing the call committee members for their work. The congregation should be encouraged to regularly pray for the work of the call committee and its members.

FORMING ST PAUL'S CALL COMMITTEE:

Please consider serving on the St. Paul's call committee that must form in the upcoming months in order to complete the process needed to call a permanent pastor as at this time Pastor Tami is serving as the Interim in a Bridge to Settled model of ministry sometimes used when churches are in transition.

The members of the call committee will be responsible for leading the congregation through a self-study process that is done prior to interviewing and eventually calling a "settled" pastor to the congregation. The SEMN synod staff (ELCA) will work with the call committee members throughout the entire process and keep the UCC MN offices updated as well.
